Mareeba has a new Boxing and Judo Hall, thanks to the Community Development Programme and our RISE job seekers. Our job seekers have developed skills in carpentry; paving; painting; welding; landscaping; concreting and other facets of the general construction and labouring industry.

The refurbishment of the hall has ensured that this infrastructure is now a community benefit, with the primary use of the property being for the Mareeba Boxing Association. Since the refurbishment of the hall, the boxing association has seen higher levels of engagement from the youth and the community than previously experienced.





The ongoing support from the Mareeba Shire Council has been invaluable to the project and RISE throughout the region. The Mareeba Shire Council has assisted with the supply of raw materials and pavers to beautify the project and allow the upskilling of the local job seekers.

confidence and stage presence and Miguel presented her with his favourite spoon, though she decided she liked the green one better than the pink lol. Miguel then prepared a native spiced apple sauce, a perfect accompaniment.



The event is forecast to air in July. Our participants have taken away special memories and are still talking about it weeks after the event took place.

This week is NAIDOC week and we celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and their cultures. RISE Ventures Upgrading The Hot Springs with Katherine Town Council

The Katherine Hot Springs has been an ongoing project for the Katherine Town Council and RISE Ventures.

The first stage involved the terracing on the main entrance bank to the Hot Springs and the installation of the gabion rock baskets. RISE Ventures have worked closely with a subcontractor from Adelaide; Prospect Construction to complete all terracing and gabion rock baskets. The skills being engaged through this Community Development Programme is ensuring that these job seekers are being upskilled in the construction industry. The second stage

will be focused at the top of the Hot Springs Park and will involve a playground, new pathway's and upgraded amenities. The completion of this project will contribute to local tourism to the area and provide further income to local business and employment outcomes for the local community.
